



Suggestions for Effective Communication

For the Speaker:

- Speak slowly and deliberately but do NOT over exaggerate mouth movements
- Get the person's attention BEFORE speaking to them
- · Do NOT chew gum, eat, smoke, or cover mouth when speaking
- Do not yell if the person wears a hearing aid it will only distort your voice
- When speaking, position yourself so the listener is within 3 feet of you and can see your face clearly
- Have adequate lighting in the room so the listener can see your face clearly
- Do NOT attempt conversations from different rooms
- Turn off distracting background noise (eg. TV, radio, dishwasher, etc.)
- · When in public, attempt to sit away from noisy areas and sit facing each other
- If your message is misunderstood, REPHRASE the words, don't just say the same thing over and over.
- Write key words if necessary
- Use facial expressions and gestures to get your meaning across
- Ask the listener occasional questions to ensure they are following your conversation

For the Listener:

- Use your hearing aids daily and make sure they are working properly
- If you do not hear, or you misunderstand, ask for repetition or clarification
- · Ask the speaker to slow down. Rapid speech can be very difficult
- Face the speaker, take notice of their lip movements, facial expressions and gestures. Make sure there is adequate room lighting for conversation
- Remind the speaker that you have trouble with your hearing. BE ASSERTIVE!
- Turn off distracting background noise (eg. TV, radio, dishwasher, etc.)
- Do NOT attempt conversations from different rooms
- If you miss part of the message, repeat the part you did hear so the speaker can fill in the gaps. Saying "WHAT?" all the time can be annoying.
- Don't pretend you heard what was said. Be active in the conversation
- Relax, it is not necessary to hear every word, your brain can fill in the gaps.
 Concentrate on what you heard, not what you missed.
- Wear your eyeglasses (if appropriate) so you can see the face/lips of the speaker
